Dear Sir:

In February 1942 I was rejected from Naval Air Corps because of color blindness. In 1942 in September, I was rejected as a cadet from Army Air Corps because of color blindness.

I heard about your success on curing color blindness. About 5 months ago I decided to see if there was anything to it. I only passed 4 out of 20. I started taking your treatments and your advice about Vitamin A. I took the treatments for about two months.

Today 9-23-43 I passed Army Air Cadet 67 physical. There was a complete color vision test. I passed the test 100% and showed o effect of color blindness.

I attribute my success on this color vision examination to your treatments.

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Dr. Freitas cases on color deficiency:

I found that most of the color deficiency cases were using margarine for spread instead of butter, also heavy fried food consumer. This was stopped and told to use butter for a spread and to broil or bake instead of fries. The reason for this is, that with the syntonic applications, I had the patient take from 100,000 to 150,000 units of Vitamin A each day and I believe Vitamin A is not absorbed in the system with synthetic or vegetable fats of any kind.

When I say color deficiency I mean just that, a totally color blind person is devoid of all colors, everything looked at is either dark or light, these persons are beyond any correction Syntonically or other wise as far as I have been able to improve.

RX for Color deficiencies:

N/L = Alpha-Delta, 15 flash N/L = Mu Theta, 15 flash on 1/1 basis

Dr. Simpson's Syntonic Rx:

Mu-Theta & Theta 10 minutes combined with prism base out incorporated In Rx during Syntonization.

A - N/L", Alpha Omega 10". Alternated with N/L 3", Mu Upsilon 10", Mu Theta 10". The same Rx was used for both. Syntonics was used every day and sometimes twice a day for two or three weeks. However, this is not an Rx to be used in all cases. I quite frequently observe the lens carefully with the mediascope and there has been no reoccurrence of the opacity. Possibly we should repeat, "there is little hope of any surgical benefit for these cases if the progression has gone beyond he first or second stage. Nor do we hold any hope for the type which starts with an even blue or milky appearance.

Dr. Mason Isiminger, Houndsville, W. Va. Has a very interesting case to report. He is one of our newer Syntonists and from all indications seems to be getting good results. Dr. Isiminger has a busy practice which he built up by doing vision training.

This is case # 2367-4 with reference to the clearing of a corneal opacity. #2367-4 was first examined October 21, 1953 at age 4 years. External Ocular O.D. normal O.S. corneal opacity - - hazy central anterior cornea.

April of last year patient had measles which settled in the left eye. The eye seems to have a scum coming over it. Holds books very close. Complains of headache temple-ward of O.D. No history of injury. Physical condition is good. (Patient's own words).

Patient was referred to Dr. David Brown, M.D. for diagnostic Prognosis. Opacity was noted but prognosis was not favorable. Unaided V.A. at this time was 20/20 O.D. At near 20/25 O.D. Finger O.S. 20/20 O.S. Ophthalmoscopy was negative.

Patient returned January 10, 1956 at which time the history was same as above except patient complained of a drawing of the eyes. Eyes hurt. Prescribed  $+ .50 \ 20/20 + .75 \ 20/50$ 

Patient complains of eyes tiring and must lie down to rest after doing near work. This patient was last examined on December 6, 1957, at which time no trace could be found of the corneal opacity. The Rx prescribed is:

- + .25 O.D.
- + 2.25 O.S.

There still remains 2 degrees of ESO at far. Patient showed 20/20 O.D. 20/40 + 3 O.S. with the Rx.

Parents extremely happy with results. Patient has changed completely from a tense, withdrawn child to a happy little extrovert.

Dr. Isiminger's Syntonic Rx used on corneal opacity cases:

Mu-Upsilon
