BUILDING A CASE OF RESERVES OF ACCOMMODATION

CASE HISTORY: Case No. 4428; housewife; age 48.

Patient came to me on November 7, 1935.

Complaint: Ache behind the eyes when reading or sewing.

Patient said eyes felt as if they would pop out.

She was conscious of a blur in the distance for a few

moments after visual concentration at near.

No blur at near. Occasionally she experienced a headache after reading which seemed to originate behind the eyes.

DESCRIPTION: Pyknic; slightly overweight; well preserved.

EXAMINATION

FINDINGS Fundus and external examination negative. N.V. 20/20+

In each eye. Subjective examination negative. Ductions At far normal. Phorias normal. Near-point examination revealed +.75 add at 16". Adduction low, amplitude of accommodation 3.00 diopters. Minus lens blur out -1.50.

SYNTONIZATIONS: Nine syntonizations N/L $\alpha\omega$

RESULTS: All symptoms had disappeared. Ductions at near normal.

Amplitude of accommodation 5.50 diopters. Minus lens

blur out -2.25. Patient was dismissed.

Report received on May 13, 1936 indicated eyes functioning very well without any distress although patient had been

engaged in normal amount of close work.

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
